My name is Marthe, and I'm writing from Mothers' Union in Kinshasa, the capital of the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). As we approach Christmas and look forward to celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ together, I want to thank you for the continued support you give to families and women around the world.

This year, I am excited to bring you some good news for Advent and Christmas. Led by the team at Mary Sumner House, Mothers' Union is taking part in the Big Give Christmas Challenge.

If you can give this Christmas, whatever you give online will go twice as far so we can help more women in the DRC change their lives for the better.

You see, life in the DRC is extremely hard for women and girls, and has been

made even tougher as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Over the past 20 years, I have seen the ongoing civil war tear through our country, bringing with it terrible poverty and a culture of violence that affects every aspect of our society. To grow up as a girl or to be a mother in this environment is hard to imagine unless you have seen it. You have to be strong and take courage in God's grace. And many women do. They wake each morning trusting in the love of God and the strength he gives them to laugh, smile and find joy in their lives.

But, for our sisters who cannot read and write, it is so much harder to be strong.

Illiteracy holds women back here, severely. It simply pushes them to the bottom of society, and robs them of the opportunities and confidence needed to combat the gender inequalities they face on a daily basis.

I recently met one of those women, Theresa at the Mothers' Union business skills training workshop here in Kinshasa.

As a girl, Theresa attended primary school, but when her mother and father died, so did Theresa's education. She was forced to join her aunt, selling food in the market, and when she was still very young, she got married.

Their first child was a girl, which made her husband angry. 'Why do you give us girls?' he would rage. 'Why can you not give us a boy? I need a boy.' Theresa's husband beat her and she cried every day. Eventually, she fell pregnant again and had a boy.

With Christmas around the corner, I am thinking of women like Theresa, and how your gift can make such a difference to their future.

Though her husband worked, he drank a lot, so there was never any money left. It fell to Theresa to put food on the table for her family. She took up dressmaking and provided household support for local ministers. They helped her learn to speak French, but not to read or write. Illiterate, she was still left out of opportunities in her community and unable to challenge the real issues that affected her, especially at home.

Your gift this Christmas can promise a brighter future for women in the DRC by giving them a second chance at education that will enable them to build a future for themselves and their family.

Finally, Theresa enrolled on our literacy and skills programme, where she learned not only how to read and write but how to plan and manage her finances. Her confidence and awareness of her rights, and the support available, grew so much, she left her abusive husband to make her own way in the world with her children.

Today, Theresa's life has completely changed. She's a leader in her community now. Not only does she teach other women how to make dresses but inspires them to learn to read and write too. As the saying goes, 'when you educate a woman, you educate a community'. That's a gift that can never be taken away.



When I think back to my childhood here in the DRC, I remember my mother's big family feast on Christmas Day. I cherish those memories, and I wish all our sisters in Christ to enjoy such happy celebrations. But if you're a woman, living in the shadows of illiteracy here today, a Christmas like that is beyond their wildest dreams. So, this Christmas will you help more women step out from the shadows of illiteracy and into the light?
